# **Backpacks for Baja**



The November Clinic celebrated reaching over 3,488 "Backpacks For Baja" distributed to those in need since the program began in 2014!!!

Chris, with the assistance of several local volunteers, distributed over 60 special backpacks to children attending the clinic. Each backpack included a special gift, sunglasses, important sundries such as tooth brushes and toothpaste as well as school supplies and a first aid kit. In addition each backpack includes a book donated by Celeste Roseberry-McKibbin of "Love Talk Read". Women attending the clinic also received 20 handmade handbags that include personal care items, sunglasses, and a special gift.

Volunteers distributed many donated items and sundries such as toothpaste, soap, shampoo and lotions. In addition

there were special handmade dresses that were made and/or acquired in support of the "Dress A Girl Around The World" initiative. This initiative is designed to provide at least one nice dress to as many young girls as possible to build Dignity, Health, Joy and Love. Each dress was personally fitted to a happy recipient. Over 75 of these dresses were distributed. The Rolling Hills Church sewing team also contributed handmade children's dresses, dolls and other children's items, including shorts for young boys, which were greatly appreciated!!!

There was also a distribution of hundreds of men, women and children's clothing items which were greatly appreciated by the thankful recipients.

We also gave out a large supply of handmade hats and scarf's as well as socks. These items were all made by the "Hooks and Needles" team of men at Folsom Prison. # **Optical Clinic**

In November 118 optical exams were completed. 100% of the patients needing glasses were fitted on the spot this month and left the clinic with a smile and greatly improved vision!!! This successful

outcome was thanks to the improved work flow instituted by **Margie Wilson** as well as her diligence and training of the entire team!!! This is very significant in our effort to assist those in need of vision care on the day they are evaluated. Margie was assisted by **Angie**, **Chris**, **Joanna** and **Sunny Inderdeep** as well as other local volunteers in the fitting/evaluation area.

Historically, we have been able to fit over 97 percent of the patients with glasses on the day of the clinic and we then order the remainder online for delivery by one of the pilots the following month.

This was a team effort. Margie managed the exam process including utilizing an Auto Refractor as well as a Spot Vision unit. **Judy**, a long time local volunteer managed the intake of new patients and assisted with exams as well as providing knowledgeable assistance to all. **Inez**, as well as **Candy Castro**, a local student and the daughter of one of our long time volunteers, gave oversight to the distribution of children's and adult sunglasses and assisted wherever needed.

We had a pre exam completed by other local volunteers including Melanie, and Sherlyn the daughters of long time volunteers, Imelda and Minerva as well as Denya, the daughter of Judy. We continued to train/utilize everyone that was capable to

ensure timely service for those in need.

The total number of patients seen was well over 150 with the 118 exams referenced above completed using the Auto Refractor and/or Spot Vision. In addition we gave out 35 pairs of readers and 2 pairs of glasses ordered from months prior. We also distributed approximately 150 pairs of sunglasses. This included Men's, Women's and Children's sunglasses. The children's sunglasses were a big hit as many of the recipients had never had the opportunity to own a pair in the past and the styles were current and "cool" with themes that they could relate to such as Spiderman, Batman and Ninja Turtles for the boys. The children's sunglasses as well as some of the readers distributed were provided by the **Restoring Vision** organization as well as **The Lions Club...**Thanks!!!

A special thanks goes out to **Randy Sharp** who custom built a pair of glasses for a young boy with serious vision issue and we did not have a good fit in stock. Thanks!!!!

The service was efficient and the success rate of fitting was excellent due to the efforts/diligence of the entire team!!!

sight of her walking over. His eyes widened and he turned to Minerva to quickly rattle off a question. The word that us poor-Spanish-speaking folks heard was 'extraction'. Poor guy thought that when he saw Theresa walking over his filling had turned into an extraction. We quickly settled his nerves that we were not going to take out his tooth, but from that point forward Theresa K. got her nickname. The EXTRACTOR (said in a Spanish accent, of course)!

Rick set up another dinner for us that night over at Eucalypto, which has to be one of the best restaurants in the world! My food, and all the others I sampled, were fantastic.

I think our take home lesson from this clinic was 'organization and simplification'. I think we can all agree that the instrumentation for extractions has become well organized over the years, but that we can use some improvement to organize and simplify the restorative (fillings) side. We came up with some ideas and hope to try and bring those into reality in the future. All for the benefit of our great patients, that we see each month down in Baja.

### When miracles happen...

We first saw 4 year old Maria in our June clinic 2018. She had chicken pox, but her mother and a case worker from Social Services brought her to our clinic because of her cleft lip/palate. Because of the chicken pox we were unable to do much for her except have her return the following month. That also gave us time to see what we could do about reconstructive surgery. After much searching which included Operation Smile and other options in Mexico, our Gold Coast Chapter of Flying Samaritans' physician Dr. Sam Bern got involved. Sometimes you just have to look close to home to find answers!

On October 11th Dr. Bern began partial repair of Maria's cleft lip. We saw her in our clinic on November 10th cleaned the wound and removed some sutures that had not dissolved. She will need additional surgery for her cleft palate, but must heal completely from this first surgery.

There are many reasons why Flying Samaritans volunteers, as well as other medical volunteers, do what they do. For me, it is to perhaps change a life, and that doesn't happen very often, but this was certainly the case with Maria.

She had very limited possibilities growing up with such a deformity. Now she can go to school, she probably would not have, and live her life like every other normal child. This is a very special child and I look forward to her smile.
